1. IDENTIFICATION OF THE ANNUAL IMPLEMENTATION REPORT

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2. OVERVIEW OF THE IMPLEMENTATION

The Annual Implementation Report 2017 of the Interreg V-A Slovakia-Hungary Cross-border Cooperation Programme has been prepared pursuant to Annex X of Commission implementation regulation (EU) 2015/207. The report is intended to give a brief overview of the activities that were undertaken in the frame of the programming process, focusing on the year 2017.

Along the first half of 2017 the Interreg V-A Slovakia-Hungary Cooperation Programme finalized the formal and eligibility check of the submitted projects of the 1st Call for Proposals. After this stage the external experts were selected and trained to evaluate the project proposals of all PAs relevant for the 1st Call for Proposals from quality point of view. Within the first call for proposals the available allocation from the European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) was 67,5 M EUR, which was divided among three priority axis. The Priority axis 1 (Nature and Culture), where 25,4M EUR was available attracted 199 project proposals with 250M EUR ERDF demand. Very high interest was detected also in Priority axis 4 (Enhancing cross-border cooperation of public authorities and people living in the border area): 7,48M EUR was opened, 145 applications were submitted with the 43M EUR ERDF demand. In PA2 however - with 34,6 M EUR frame amount -, which is a continuously open call for proposals, a more decent interest was experienced with 11 arrived applications of 9,8 M EUR ERDF demand.

Assessor trainings connected to the PA4 projects took place on 23, 24 and 27 February 2017 in Budapest. After sending out the results of the admissibility, administrative and eligibility assessment two complaint board meetings were held with the representatives of the MA and NA on 23 February and 22 March 2017 in Budapest.

After finishing the evaluation process in case of PA4 the JS prepared the ranking list and started the organization of the 5th Monitoring Committee meeting which took place on 04 April 2017 in Budapest. One of the agenda points in this meeting was the approval of this list of projects. Altogether 29 projects were approved in PA 4 with an amount of 7,3M EUR and the contracting procedure of the selected applications has started (one project stepped back from contracting). After announcing the results of the PA4 applications the JS opened the



possibility for the rejected applicants to have an insight look on the quality assessment of their project as well as to pick up the two copies of the applications. The original version will be archived in line with the valid regulations. The applicants could arrange a date with the JS for this consultation appointment, where the experiences could have been also discussed.

On 13 February 2017 the first round of the Call for Small Project Fund Umbrella project proposals was published. The goal of this call was to identify and select the management organization for the Small Project Fund. The call was open until 03 March 2017, and until this deadline four project proposals were submitted. After the formal and eligibility evaluation carried out by the JS the proposals were handed over to the external experts for quality evaluation.

The programme organized a technical meeting with the MA, NA and JS colleagues related to the topic of B-Light on 22-23 February 2017. The call for proposals for the implementation of the Beneficiary Light Scheme was prepared by the Joint Secretariat and launched on 06 April 2017. The aim of the call was to identify and select the management organizations for implementing the Beneficiary Light Scheme within the Programme. The JS was also working on the documents of a call for proposals within PA3 (Promoting sustainable and quality employment). The programme organized a technical meeting with the MA, NA and JS colleagues related to the topic of TAPE (Territorial Action Plans for Employment) on 01 June 2017.

Assessors training took place on 20 April 2017 in Budapest connected to the PA1 and PA2 projects. After finalizing the quality assessment of the PA1 and PA2 the ranking list of the projects were prepared. The 6th Monitoring Committee meeting was organised on 26-27 June 2017 in Košice and the approval of the winning list was planned to be one of the agenda points. Finally the approval of projects was postponed for the next Monitoring Committee meeting.

The 7th MC meeting was held on 17 July 2017 in Budapest, the main agenda point of the meeting was the approval of the applications of the PA1 and PA2. After a long discussion, the members of the Monitoring Committee agreed on increasing the financial allocation of the PA1 within the first call for proposals and approved 29 projects in an amount of 40,2M EUR of ERDF. In PA2 1,6M EUR of ERDF were committed for two projects. After announcing the results of the PA1 and PA2 applications the JS opened again the possibility for the rejected applicants to have an insight look on the quality assessment of their project as well as to pick up the two copies of the applications.

Furthermore, the second round of the Call for Small Project Fund Umbrella Project was launched on 01 August 2017. As a result of the first round of the Call for Small Project Fund Umbrella Projects all together four Umbrella Project proposals were approved by the Monitoring Committee to be responsible for management of the Small Project Fund in the framework of the Interreg V-A SKHU Programme. The aim of the second round of the Call was to invite the successful applicants to further develop their Umbrella Project proposals and deliver guiding documents related to the management and implementation of the Small Project Fund within the Programme.



Additionally the programme has opened a call for proposals within PA3 to the public on 08 September 2017. The call is the first round of a two-round selection procedure in the frame of the third priority axis – Promoting sustainable and quality employment and supporting labour mobility. The amount of the financial allocation for the PA3 and the present call is 34 608 080 EUR. The call was open until 15 December 2017.

The Joint Secretariat asked for the cooperation of the self-governing regions, county governments and Info points in organizing information days relating to the Call for Proposals in PA3. This methodology proved to be very effective in terms of reaching the largest possible number of potential applicants in the given region. Based on the estimated interest 4 Hungarian and 3 Slovak events were held in the Eastern and Western part of the eligible area. The events were held one month after the opening of call for proposals in October 2017.

European Cooperation Day 2017 was also celebrated within the programme by announcing the launch of the first projects. Four projects have been selected to represent the programme on the occasion of the EC Day. The common characteristic of the chosen projects was that they all serve public interest in their own special way. These projects organized their opening events on 20-21-22 September 2017, which was promoted by the programme and strengthened by media attention. The Interreg SKHU Programme also joined a conference titled "Cross-border developments in a spirit of Visegrad Cooperation", that took place at the Corvinus University of Budapest. The experts – among other topics - discussed those local and regional development, cooperation possibilities, which could be derived from the cross-border infrastructure developments based on an agreement between the Hungarian and Slovakia governments done in 2014. The Joint Secretariat presented how the innovation of the Interreg V-A SKHU programme, the Territorial Action Plans for Employment can contribute to the implementation of the above mentioned agreement.

The programme organized a meeting with the Slovak and Hungarian FLC colleagues on 2nd November 2017. The monitoring system of the programme (IMIS) was introduced to the SK FLC colleagues in the framework of a technical meeting organized on 22 November 2017.

On the official website of the programme a few, minor modifications were implemented by the maintenance company based on the operational experiences of the first year. From communication point of view the JS was keeping the target group informed about the stages of the programme implementation and other via the programme website, by the mean of programme newsletter and through social media channels (Facebook and LinkedIn).

Reimbursement of funds

During the reporting period no expenditures for certification were reported by the CA. The CA did not notify any irregularities in the reported period.

Progress in designation process

Regarding designation process for the period 2014-2020 continuous discussion with the involvement of all management bodies continued in 2017. The examination of the electronic



system by the Audit Authority has started on 22 June 2017; the IMIS 2014-2020 system was presented to the representatives of the Audit Authority. A second presentation was held on the open question of the system on 12 December 2017. The Audit Report was issued with an unqualified opinion regarding the programme except for the Small Project Fund scheme on 19 December 2017. The European Commission was informed about the result of the designation on 20 December 2017 via SFC system by the Audit Authority.

3. IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PRIORITY AXIS

3.1. Overview of the implementation

		After finalizing the quality assessment of the PA 1 the ranking list of the projects were prepared. The 6th Monitoring Committee meeting was organised on 26-27 June 2017 in Košice and the approval of the winning list was planned as one of the agenda points. Finally the approval of projects was postponed for the 7th Monitoring Committee meeting, held on 17 July 2017 in Budapest, where the Monitoring Committee agreed on increasing the indicative financial allocation launched within the PA1 in the first Call for proposals and approved 29 projects in an amount of 40,2M EUR of ERDF. Contracted procedure has started with the selected projects; 12 subsidy contracts were concluded by the end of the year.

The call was open until 03 March 2017, and until this deadline two project proposals were submitted. 		The call for proposals for the implementation of the Beneficiary Light Scheme was also opened on 06 April 2017, however a written procedure was launched on cancelling the B-Light scheme on 29 November 2017. The reasons for the withdrawal of the B-Light scheme were the following: simplification of the

		procedure, easier method to be implemented (de minimis scheme for the support of SMEs), speeding up of the payments, no designation and no dedicated amount for umbrella organisations would arise with the application of de minimis.
PA2	Enhancing cross- border mobility	After finalizing the quality assessment of the PA 2 the ranking list of the projects was prepared. The 6th Monitoring Committee meeting was organised on 26-27 June 2017 in Košice and the approval of the winning list was planned as one of the agenda points. Finally the approval of projects was postponed for the 7th Monitoring Committee meeting, held on 17 July 2017 in Budapest, where the Monitoring Committee approved 2 projects in an amount of 1,6 M EUR of ERDF. The call for proposals is continuously open regarding PA 2 and applications could be submitted continuously. Based on the relatively low interest for PA2, the programme has prepared communication actions. Interested partners were addressed directly asking them to submit their idea of the project proposal indicating the timeframe of the implementation. Personal consultations were also provided for the better development of applications. As a result nine more project proposals were submitted along 2017 in an amount of 13,97 M EUR of ERDF.

The call is the first round of a two-round selection procedure launched in the frame of the third priority axis — Promoting sustainable and quality employment and supporting labour mobility. The amount of the financial allocation for the PA3 and the present call is 34 608 080 EUR. The call was open until 15 December 2017 and 16 proposals have arrived till the deadline. The Joint Secretariat asked for the cooperation of the self-governing regions, county governments and Info points in organizing information days relating to the Call for Proposals in PA3. This methodology proved to be very effective in terms of reaching the largest possible number of potential applicants in the given region. Based on the estimated interest 4 Hungarian and 3 Slovak events were held in the Eastern and Western part of the eligible area. The events were held one month after the opening of call for proposals in October 2017. The complexity of the Specific objective 3.1 determines comprehensive development plans which induce integrated projects including infrastructural elements and soft activities. Since expected results require complex interventions the selection process is divided into two selection rounds. As a first step — the applicants were obliged to create a complex

		development plan called Territorial action plan for employment [TAPE]. The evaluation process of submitted TAPEs is furthermore divided into three parts according to the competency of different stakeholders: - JS examines whether the specific objectives of the submitted application are in line with the specific objectives of the Priority axis and whether the basic operational criteria important for smooth implementation are met. - The territorial assessors examine coherence with local development plans, relevance of the identified territorial needs and integration of the TAPE with different local sectorial initiatives. - The sectoral assessors examine the overall feasibility of the proposed projects and their coherence with national development plans and initiatives. The aim of the selection process is to select the TAPEs which contribute most to the achievement of priority objectives.
PA4	Enhancing cross- border cooperation of public authorities and people	After the evaluation process on the 5th Monitoring Committee meeting which took place on 04 April 2017 in Budapest, the Monitoring Committee gave approval for 29 projects in the PA 4 with an amount of 7,3 M EUR. Afterwards the Joint Secretariat started the contracting procedure of the selected applications. Altogether the contracting procedure was finalised in the case of 28 projects in 2017. One project withdrew from contracting, which resulted an approved amount of 6,99 M EUR ERDF On 13 February 2017 the first round of the call for Small Project Fund Umbrella Project proposals to select the management organization for the Small Project Fund was launched. The call was open until 03 March 2017, and until this deadline two project proposals were submitted. The second round of the Call for Small Project Fund Umbrella Project was launched on 01 August 2017 with submission deadline on 31 August 2017. The aim of the second round of the Call was to invite the successful applicants to further develop their Umbrella Project proposals and deliver guiding documents related to the management and implementation of the Small Project Fund. The Audit Authority could not audit the Small Project Fund scheme, therefore does not issue an opinion regarding this scheme of the Programme.

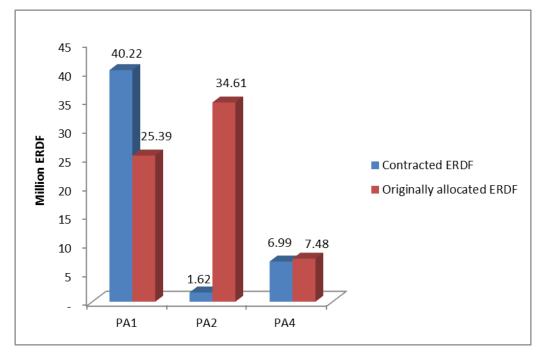


Table 1: Contracted ERDF amount in the first Call for Proposals

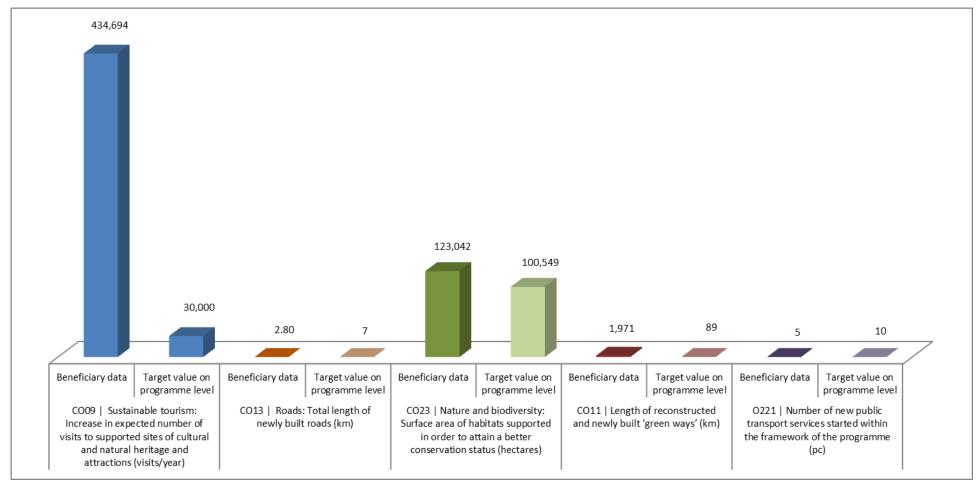


Table 2: Contracted value of indicators in PA1 and PA2 in the first Call for Proposals



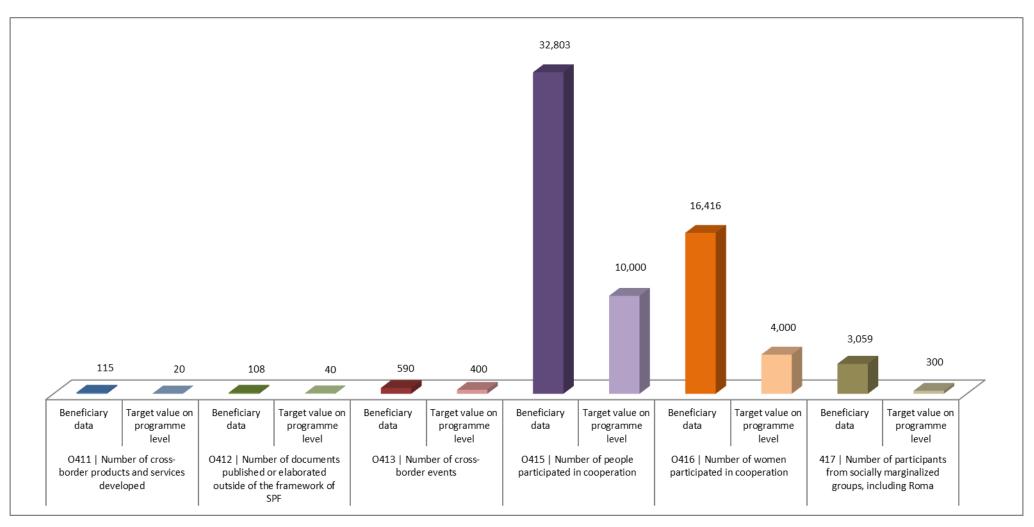


Table 3: Contracted value of indicators in PA4 in the first Call for Proposals

4. SYNTHESIS OF THE EVALUATIONS

Synthesis of the findings of all evaluations of the programme that have become available during the previous financial year, including the name and reference period of the evaluation reports used.

Evaluation of the Programme (Phase 1) is foreseen in year 2018.

5. ISSUES AFFECTING THE PERFORMANCE OF THE PROGRAMME AND MEASURES TAKEN

Interreg V-A Slovakia-Hungary Cooperation Programme has incorporated or intended to incorporate several novelties which were not applied in the antecedent programmes, as Small Project Fund based on subsidiarity, financing SMEs by widening the scope of potential applicants compared to previous period, and more territorial focus in case of Action Plans in priority axis 3. The planning of the Small Project Fund and SME Scheme has been proceeded during the previous years; after several discussions with the relevant stakeholders in Budapest and in Bratislava the selection criteria for SPF umbrella projects was approved and the drafting of ruling documents as well as the template for the strategy were finalised by the end of the year. However the decision on the composition of the management system took more time than was initially planned, the launching of the Call for Proposals for the SPF umbrella projects was postponed to 2017. The first call for proposals to select the management organization for the Small Project Fund was launched on 13 February 2017 with the submission deadline on 03 March 2017, and the second round of the Call was launched on 01 August 2017 with the submission deadline on 31 August 2017. After both rounds of the call the administrative as well as eligibility assessment was carried out by the JS and the quality assessment by the external assessors. The quality assessment of the second round of the call was finalized on 25 October 2017 and afterwards several technical meetings of the programme management bodies took place in order to set up the implementation as well as reporting system of the SPF. Due to the necessity to clarify opened questions in terms of the most efficient set-up of this innovative tool within the Programme, the decision making process could not have been finalized in 2017 and is foreseen in first quarter of 2018.

The call for proposals for the implementation of the Beneficiary Light Scheme was also opened on 06 April 2017 with the submission deadline on 24 April 2017. Until the submission deadline one project proposal has been submitted. The submitted Umbrella project proposal was assessed against the administrative and eligibility criteria by the JS and against the quality criteria by the external assessors. The quality assessment process was finalized in September 2017. However the MC decided on cancelling the Call for B-Light Scheme Project Proposals in a written procedure on 29 November 2017. The reasons for the withdrawal of the B-Light scheme was the following: simplification of the procedure, easier method to be implemented (de minimis scheme for the support of SMEs), speeding up of the payments, no



designation and no dedicated amount for umbrella organisations would arise with the application of de minimis.

Concerning the Priority Axis 3 – Promoting sustainable and quality employment and supporting labour mobility - during 2017 the terms and conditions of the application procedures has been elaborated. Operations are to be selected through open calls for proposals in two-round selection procedure. All the actions shall be implemented as part of a territorial action plan. The integrated territorial action plans must contain actions addressing the full thematic scope of the specific objective, and reflecting to the requirements of specific territories, sectors or functions, present strategic approach.

In the first round, the proposals contain the action plan, without the detailed description of the projects. The eligibility of the action plans will be evaluated first. An action plan should provide detailed justification on the contribution of the actions to the strategy and to the specific objective of the priority axes.

The Joint Secretariat asked for the cooperation of the self-governing regions, county governments and Info points in organizing information days relating to the Call for Proposals in PA3. This methodology proved to be very effective in terms of reaching the largest possible number of potential applicants in the given region. Based on the estimated interest 4 Hungarian and 3 Slovak events were held in the Eastern and Western part of the eligible area.

The call for proposal for the first round of a two-round selection procedure has been launched on 08 September 2017. The amount of the financial allocation for the PA3 and the present call is 34 608 080 EUR. The call was open until 15 December 2017 and 16 proposals have arrived till the deadline. Because of the complexity of the objectives of the Priority Axis the selection of the Territorial Action Plans and the Call for proposal for the second round are foreseen in 2018, and the first projects can start the implementation from the end of 2018, it is recommended to consider decrease the milestone set for 2018 of the financial indicator of PA3.

The call for proposals is continuously open regarding PA 2 and applications could be submitted continuously.

Based on the relatively low interest for PA2 (in 2016 only four proposals were submitted, all in SO 2.2.1 Improving cross-border public transport services), the programme has prepared communication actions. Interested partners were addressed directly asking them to submit their idea of the project proposal indicating the timeframe of the implementation. Personal consultations were also provided for the better development of applications. As a result nine more project proposals were submitted along 2017 in an amount of 13,97 M EUR of ERDF.

At the planning of the Cooperation Programme high priority was given to the development needs of transport infrastructure due to the high-level commitment made at Prime Minister's level between the two Member States and based on pre-identification of possible transport solution. By taking them into account the Cooperation Programme was adopted and the Call for Proposals was launched in 2016 with the continuous submission possibility.



The two Member States knowing the border region interest started to have the bottoms-up approach and the JS organized all events for potential beneficiaries after launching the Call for Proposals.

With time it became obvious that due to the a) size of such developments, b) some legal changes, c) different environmental aspects, d) liquidity reasons in pre-financing (not only in implementation but in the preparation of such big projects) e) different scope of responsibility in transport development sector (centralized/decentralized) in both Member States special treatment and attention shall be paid to transport project development.

Constant and strong coordination mechanism was set up with the involvement of the Managing Authority, National Authority, ministries being responsible for either for financing, for coordination or for transport sector in order to come up with solution to support beneficiaries on both sides.

We can conclude that a strong top-down approach was requested to be done under this PA instead of a bottoms-up approach.

Hungary and the Slovak Republic identified possible transport project ideas to be submitted under PA2.

Hungary provides pre-financing from state sources. From financial point of view the Slovak Republic had successful negotiations with banks over the pre-financing of projects. The financial institutions presented willingness to provide support in this matter and pre-finance the national co-financing and own contribution amounts.

We can state that following the remedy actions taken by the two Member States and the Programme, we provided the possibility to finance some projects.

Other obstacles under PA2 were also identified. Logistic project ideas are planned to be supported however the state aid incidence strongly influenced the willingness of the potential applicants. It became obvious that state aid in logistic area (Regional Aid) strongly determines a very low rate of intensity which might result in non-acceptance of the support decided by the Monitoring Committee and communicated by the Managing Authority with the condition that own contribution shall be intensively raised.

Regarding designation process for the period 2014-2020 continuous discussion with the involvement of all management bodies continued in 2017. The examination of the electronic system by the Audit Authority has started on 19 October 2017; the IMIS 2014-2020 system was presented to the representatives of the Audit Authority. A second presentation was held on the open question of the system on 12 December 2017. The Audit Report was issued with an unqualified opinion regarding the programme except for the Small Project Fund scheme on 19 December 2017.

Regarding the status of e-cohesion the development of IT system is continued: the specification of Programme, CfP, Application Form, Integrated Control as well as National and TA module of IMIS system has proceeded. Live system of Programme, CfP, Project modules have been set up.



6. CITIZEN'S SUMMARY

The Annual Implementation Report 2017 of the Interreg V-A Slovakia-Hungary Cooperation Programme has been prepared pursuant to Annex X of Commission implementing regulation (EU) 2015/207. The report is intended to give a brief overview of the activities that were undertaken in the frame of the programming process, focusing on the year 2017.

During the year several calls for proposals were launched in different topics:

- 2nd round of the Call for Small Project Fund Umbrella Project Proposals 01 August 2017– 31 August 2017
- Call for proposals for Territorial action plans (TAPE) SKHU1703 08 September 15 December 2017
- Call for Assessors for TAPE 24 November 2017 15 December 2017

Most of the calls were aimed at two initiatives to involve the small and medium enterprises (SMEs) in the programme, and the Small Project Fund, which will facilitate the implementation of the small budgeted project ideas. Discussions on setting up of the most efficient and fit-for-purpose development schemes supporting the SMEs and small projects within the Programme eligible area are ongoing and the results are foreseen in early 2018.

The Call for proposals for Territorial action plans was a more wide-spread and less targeted opportunity to apply for grants. The programme was expecting strategic ideas with complex and coherent development plans in the regions to reach specific aims (chosen by the beneficiaries). Related to the TAPE call several **info days** were organized with the cooperation of the self-governing regions, county governments and Info points. Based on the estimated interest 4 Hungarian and 3 Slovak events were held in the Eastern and Western part of the eligible area. By the given deadline 16 actions plans were submitted, whose assessment will start early next year.

Three Monitoring Committee (MC) meetings were held last year on 04 April 2017 in Budapest, on 26-27 June 2017 in Senec and on 17 July 2017 in Budapest. During the <u>spring session</u> among other issues the members of the committee decided about the winning list of projects submitted under the SKHU/1601 call for proposals, **Priority axis 4.1** (Enhancing cross-border cooperation of public authorities and people living in the border area). **145 applications were submitted to the Joint Secretariat (JS), 29 of which were approved**. During the contracting phase one project stepped back, and finally 28 projects started the implementation by the end of 2017 in the amount of 7 292 761.03 EUR ERDF.

During the MC meeting in July the selection decision was made about the project proposals, as well within the frame of **Priority axis 1** (Nature and culture) and **Priority axis 2** (Crossborder mobility). **199 applications** had been received by the Joint Secretariat (JS)



requesting altogether 252 017 052,05 EUR of ERDF. In PA 2 the Call was continuously open, and 11 applications arrived so far with an ERDF request of 9 863 745,68 EUR. As the result of the assessment procedure the ranking list was prepared by the JS, and the MC members decided about the support of 29 projects within PA1 with the amount 40 222 436.96 EUR ERDF and 2 projects within PA2. By the end of the year 12 projects were contracted in PA1 and both in PA2 1 616 793.23 EUR.

For the <u>European Cooperation Day 2017</u> the JS used the opportunity to live up to the credo of the ECDay 'Go local!'. Four projects – that were just about to launch their implementation – have been selected to represent the programme on the occasion. The common characteristic of the chosen projects was that they all **serve public interest** in their own special way. The projects aim the environmental education of school children, introducing the Eurokey system to public buildings for people with reduced mobility, Silver economy is facilitating the promotion of 'silver' products and services, while the SAD project is dealing with the re-integration of people into society who are struggling with some kind of addiction.
